Alina Varona, College of Marin (COM), Dean of Career Education and Workforce Development (CEWD)	Welcome, Introductions, and College Updates	Alina shared the overview Career Education programs and objectives of College of Marin (COM). Please refer to the presentation slides copied at the end of these notes. Note action items highlighted in yellow. Chief Jason Weber provided updates on the new fire housing. - Barriers early in careers for potential emergency services personnel make it hard to fill much-needed positions, so the new housing at COM will be a good step forward. Old pool area will be the facility for vehicle mechanics. Building 17, the old library, will be modified with private dorms, more restrooms for COM emergency services students. Estimate \$15 million investment. - Timeline – go to COM board with schematic design by end of 2023, more finalized design in first quarter of 2024. Drawings submitted to state architect early summer, bids at the end of the year.
Open Discussion	Advisory Share Outs and Updates	The committee discussed program and work opportunities tied to Fire Technology in conjunction with housing and vehicle storage at Indian Valley Campus: - Vehicle maintenance and diesel mechanics is another related career path that is much needed. Could connect to the already-existing COM Auto department. - Ron Palmer - Currently offer an entry-level diesel mechanics course at COM and would like to expand. - John Dicochea – had experience with auto tech internship program with DeAnza College and could connect Auto students with county-run auto shops. Action: John and Alina will talk offline to share info about a learn and earn program.

		 Leslie Pfeiffer – could also incorporate the dual-enrollment NUSD Auto class students to internships Larry Pasero – class or certificate program to onboard defensible space personnel. Think of it as being in the customer service business to build connections with the community and prioritize soft skills. Jason Weber – Napa and SRJC Paramedic programs are full. It would be great to have a program in Marin. Alina – The sticking point is a bottleneck for clinical rotations. Joshua Dimon – What would it look like to build a pathway from defensible space training and vegetation control into other occupations?
Ken Allen, COM, Fire Technology, Instructor	Program Updates: EMT/EMR; EMT – Dual Enrollment NHS, AHA CPR at COM	Ken provided an overview of new opportunities in growing the Fire Technology program. Currently College of Marin and our EMT/EMR training is currently not an American Heart Association training center. We would like at least be training provider and certification site or at least an affiliated center. Would like to get affiliation with an already existing training center. After 2 years working as affiliate, can then apply for our own training program. Jason Weber suggested that Marin County Fire may be a training center. Action: Chief Weber and Ken to discuss later. - Potential for Bachelor's program at COM for firefighters and EMS. Need at least associate's for captain's position, at least bachelor's for chief position. COM already has an AA in public safety. Could do one in vocational education or emergency service management. Goal is for way for people to promote to chief or admin, or for students to train for specific position in emergency services. - Alina – Community Colleges can build a bachelor's degree program as long as it

		 doesn't conflict with other institution's bachelor's degree, we can prove livable wage jobs are available, and we can sustain the class with enough enrollments. Richard – tech aspect of Fire is much needed. John Bagala – Bachelor's degree would be taken by people already in the fire service. Fire fighter's schedule requirements is challenge to a degree program. Alina – Associates degrees that give priority into bachelor's programs are the most successful.
Angela Olmanson, COM, Program Administrator, Allied Health	Dual Enrollment Updates	 Shared demographics for dual enrollment classes. Dual enrollment started spring 2021 with Novato High School. High school students will have EMT certificate when graduate and complete the program.

Foundry Updates	 Mimi – have amended onboarding to add more students in May instead of beginning of year. Josh – think about how to connect people to jobs in defensible space. Frontiers of Fire – partnering with other organizations. Goal is to do more training in the field. Please refer to the presentation slides copied at the end of these notes.
Kathleen Smyth, COM, Department Chair Kinesiology, Health and Athletics	Development of Fitness Course for Fire and Public Safety	 Beginning Firefighting and Public Safety Conditioning course – building curriculum for this class based on City College class. Some scheduling issues. 2-unit course needs to be 6 hours of activity. COM doesn't have some of needed equipment for the course, and need plan for where to store the equipment. Instructor will put together list of equipment that is needed now. Important to have firefighters involved - instructor only has fitness background. Equipment needed: hoses, stair climb, carrying equipment, forcible entry, ceiling breach and pull John shared resources for equipment. Potentially have student exercise while wearing the equipment. CCSF requires 2 unit of the course, SRJC required 1 so this planned course will

		cover students who want to move on to the fire academy in either course.
Linda Vaughn, Bay Area Regional Director, Public Safety	Public Safety Regional Efforts and Bachelor's Degree Creation	 Keep in mind you don't have to carry a hose or fire a gun to have a job in public safety – non-traditional career pathways that earn a living wage are available. Incorporate more ELL learners – learning English, and healthcare Challenge of shortage of faculty to train people – no time to teach because of mandatory overtime hours in place Apprenticeships – just got approval for paramedic apprenticeship. Next step – preapprenticeship for EMT so they get paid while completing the program. Bachelor's degree – Miramar College was recently approved for bachelor's in Public Safety. ACTION: Public safety regional joint venture – next meeting Dec 1 – send info to Linda if would like to attend. John Bagala- as well as get the job, important to keep the job and be successful in career. Also need to be aware of occupational hazard of high rates of cancer, behavioral health issues from experiences in the job. Important to build resiliency through peer programs, IFF Resiliency Program. 3 curriculums in the CA State Fire Marshall's office for behavioral health and cancer support at the entry and chief officer level. Alina- Also an area where COM and Ken Allen are working to build curriculum.

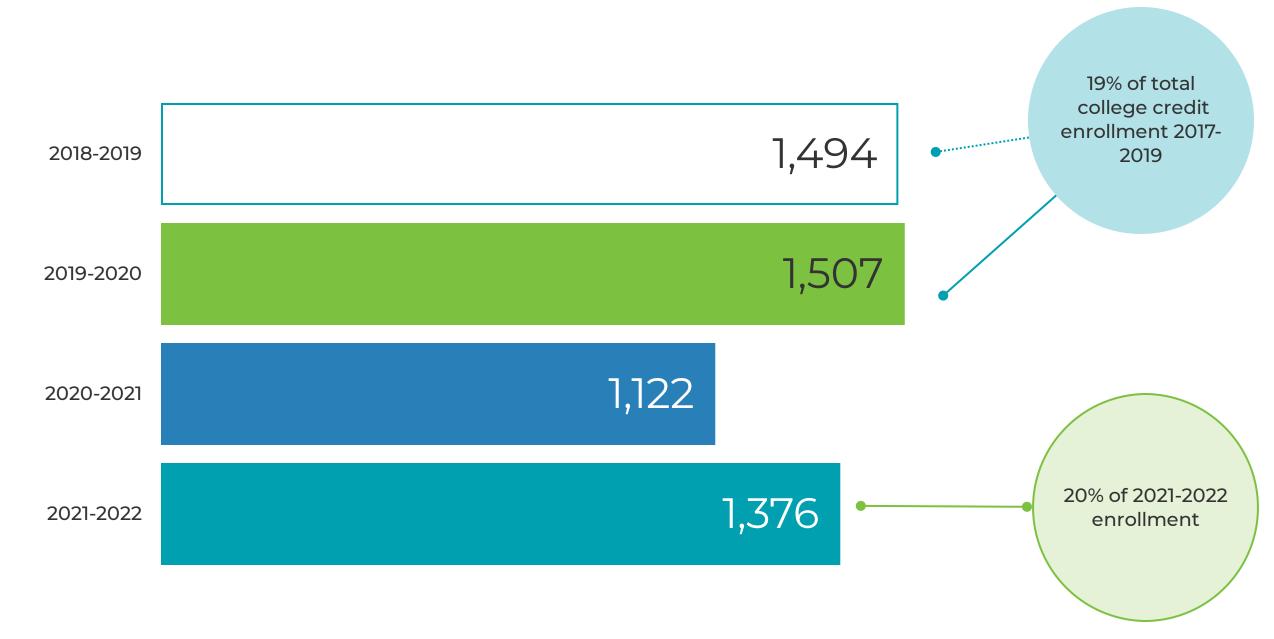

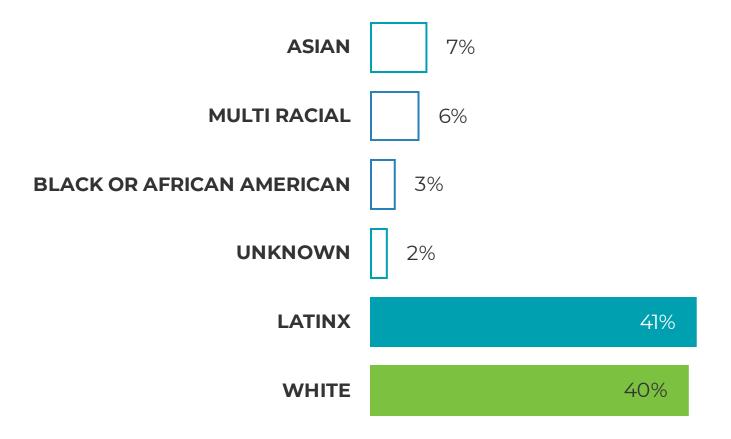

NATIVE HAWAIIAN, PACIFIC ISLANDER, AMERICAN INDIAN, ALASKA NATIVE MASKED N<4

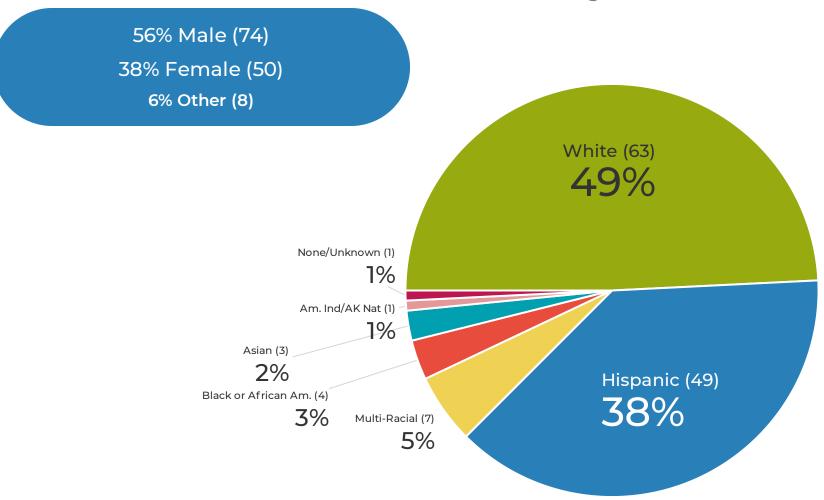
Career Education Student Demographics

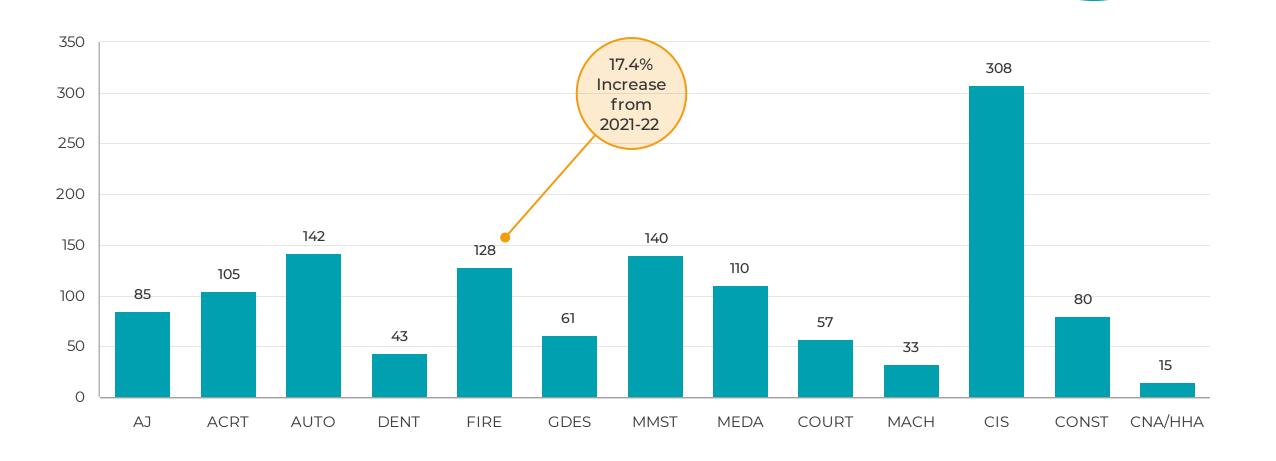
Increase in both Latinx and Women Students in FIRE/EMT

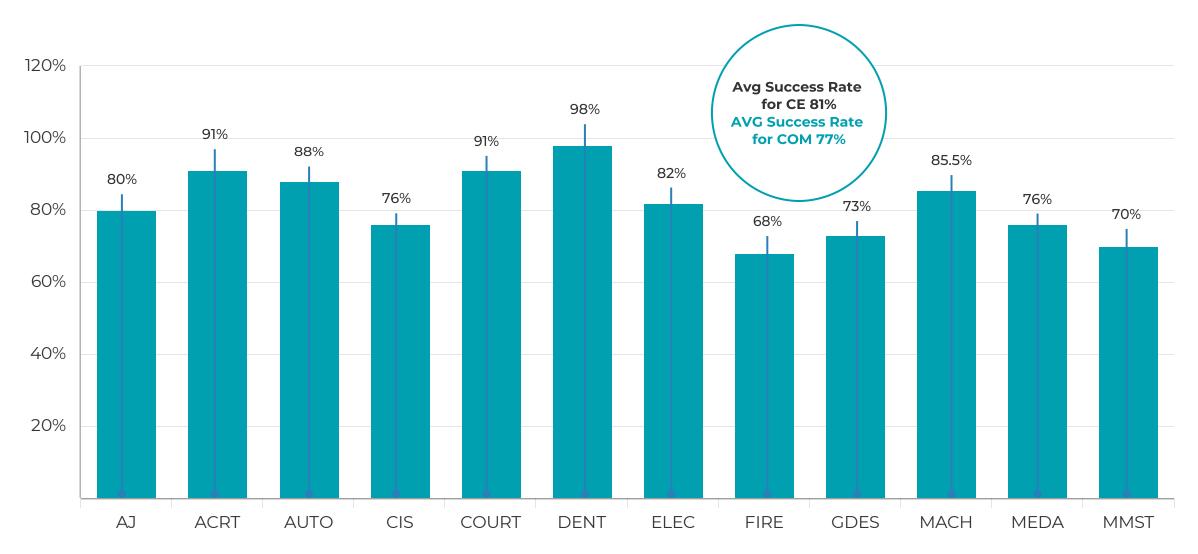

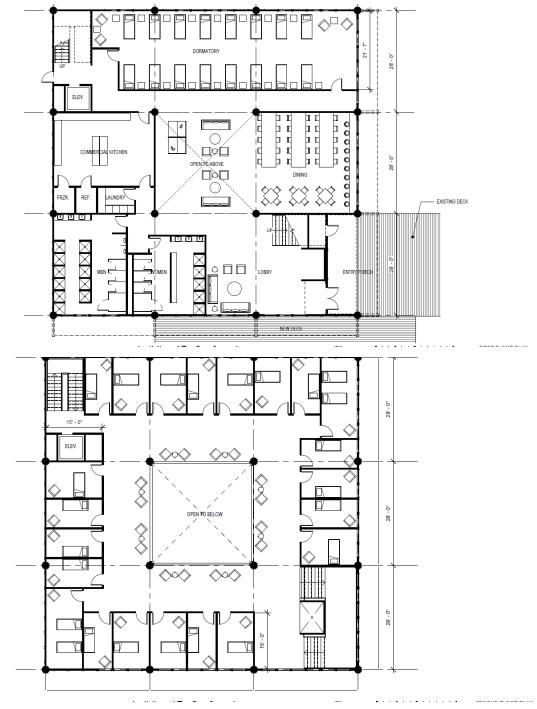

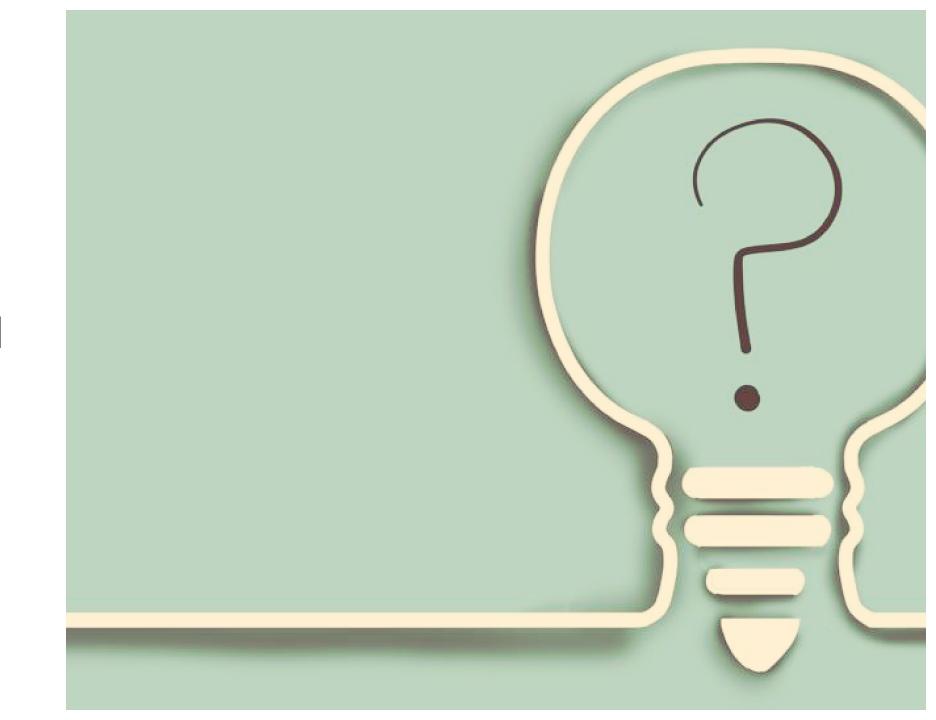

Does this seem true for the current climate of relevant occupations?

Feedback in 2022:

- EMT jobs do offer have much better pay now.
- 911 companies are hurting ("starving") for EMT candidates.
- Firefighters with paramedic training, the salary can start at \$120,000/year.
 The pay varies from seasonal firefighters to full-time, professional paid.
- Private institutions salaries are rising.
 They are realizing that if they want to retain employees they will have to pay better

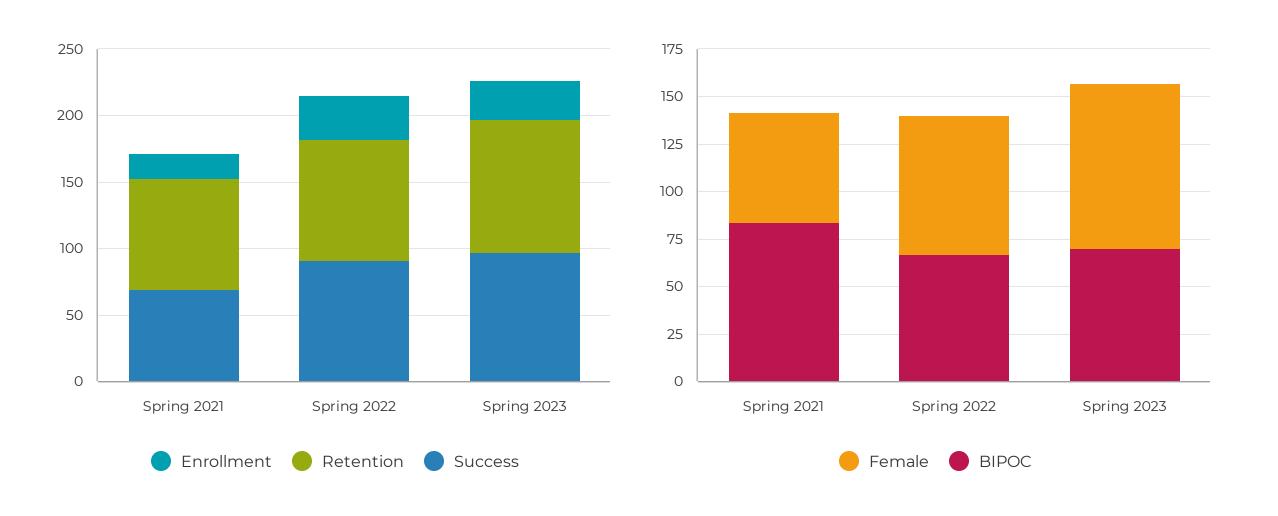
